SUBJECT: Request to approve recurring contracts (Clerk's File) for \$30,533 each between the County and the Women's Shelter Program of San Luis Obispo County and RISE San Luis Obispo County for disbursement of County Domestic Violence Program Special Fund Monies and Battered Women's Shelter Trust Account Monies. All Districts.

RECOMMENDATION

The District Attorney's Victim/Witness Division recommends that the Board approve and direct the Chairperson to sign annual contracts to disburse Domestic Violence Special Fund monies and funds from the Battered Women's Shelter Trust Account with the following:

1. Women's Shelter Program of San Luis Obispo County for a grant in the amount of \$30,533; and
2. RISE for a grant in the amount of \$30,533.

DISCUSSION

The County sets aside \$23 from each marriage license fee issued for the purpose of funding domestic violence programs. Historically, two agencies have applied for and received funds: the Women's Shelter Program of San Luis Obispo County and RISE. Both agencies are eligible to receive these funds based on 2007 criteria set forth in the Welfare and Institutions Code as amended by the passage of AB 2084 which restricts this funding to "domestic violence shelter-based programs".

In addition to the trust account generated from marriage license fees, fines collected from defendants convicted of domestic violence pursuant to Penal Code 1203.097(a)(11)(A) and designated for battered women's shelters, are also available for disbursement. Pursuant to Welfare & Institution Code 18305(c) the Board of Supervisors may request a quarterly accounting of the special fund.

As both shelters provide similar services, we recommend that the County divide the available funding equally, as it has done in prior years.

After the deduction of a 5% administrative fee, the combined total of both trust accounts budgeted by the District Attorney and available for disbursement is \$61,066, or \$30,533 per shelter. As with prior years, the County's District Attorney's Victim/Witness Assistance Division has administered the contracts and disbursed the funds through the District Attorney's budget with no impact on the General Fund.

OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT/IMPACT

Both women shelter programs and a number of community public and non-profit agencies and groups are members of the County's Domestic Violence Task Force and their representatives participate on the Task Force on a bi-monthly basis.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

All funds recommended for distribution are generated through the Domestic Violence Shelter Based Programs Act of 2006 and the Battered Women's Shelter Trust Account. As with prior years, the District Attorney's Victim/Witness Division retains a 5% administrative fee from the accumulated funds to help cover the costs of preparing and processing the contracts. After the deduction of the administrative fee, the funds available for distribution equal \$61,066 or \$30,533 per shelter. This action will disburse \$30,533 to the Women's Shelter Program of San Luis Obispo County and \$30,533 to RISE.

RESULTS

As intended by law, disbursement of these funds will augment the local women's shelters' budgets and provide additional funding for shelter-based emergency and support services for victims of domestic violence and their children. For FY 2013-14, the Women's Shelter Program of San Luis Obispo County (WSP) provided 4,119 shelter nights and 12,357 meals for 96 clients, including women and children. The WSP also provided 6,354 nights of transitional housing to 43 clients and their children. RISE provided 4,116 shelter nights and 12,348 meals for 95 women and children. In addition to shelter services, both shelters offer crisis counseling, individual and group counseling, restraining order assistance, case management, information and referrals, and outreach services to survivors of domestic violence and their children.

The disbursement of these funds to our County's two women shelters supports the District Attorney's Victim/Witness Assistance Center's goal to "reduce the effects of crime on victims, family members, and the community" by providing augmented funding for these two essential referral agencies in our community. During FY 2013-14, the Victim/Witness Assistance Center assisted over 4,489 victims of crime and 20% were victims of domestic violence and related crimes. Referrals between the Victim/Witness Assistance Center and the two women shelter programs link victims with services that reduce their confusion and frustration with the criminal justice system and enhance the domestic violence victim's ability to reclaim and reorganize their lives.
