Project Title SLO Coalition
Brief Summary of Proposed Project County of San Luis Obispo proposes to create a diverse, broad working coalition, known as SLO Coalition, to combat the opioid epidemic in the county using the three federal priority areas as a framework. Specifically, the action steps will include: 1) implementation of common pain medication prescribing practices amongst the four hospitals (area 1); 2) increased utilization of CURES (area 1); 3) increased referral and transition to the substance use disorder treatment network (area 1); 4) expansion of medication-assisted treatment slots in our County (area 2); and 5) increased distribution of naloxone in community and law enforcement settings (area 3).

Application Narrative

1. What does this coalition aim to accomplish during the grant period?

- a. **Support safe prescribing practices:** San Luis Obispo Coalition (SLO Coalition) plans to implement common prescribing guidelines for emergency departments across the four local hospitals. In this federal priority area, SLO Coalition also plans to increase the routine utilization of CURES by all primary care physicians, specialist MDs, and emergency departments. SLO Coalition will work with local primary care physicians and groups to develop a referral network and warm hand-off transitions to substance use disorder treatment specialists as appropriate, increasing information sharing about the options for treatment in our community.
- b. **Expand access to medication-assisted treatment:** The expansion of substance use disorder treatment specialists capable of utilizing medication-assisted treatment will be needed as currently San Luis Obispo County Drug and Alcohol Services is at capacity. One way we anticipate this will be accomplished is through the expansion of the number of licensed physicians accepting referrals for buprenorphine treatment.
- c. **Increase naloxone access:** San Luis Obispo County Drug and Alcohol Services has worked with a variety of community based organizations for the distribution of naloxone, including the Syringe Exchange Program, Sober Living Environments, and Drug and Alcohol Services clinic locations. However, there is much work to be done in this area—we propose to implement distribution at primary care clinics, other substance use disorder treatment points of access, through law enforcement agencies and at the County Jail. SLO Coalition will increase utilization of naloxone through public information dissemination.

2. Why is the lead organization well-positioned for this role? San Luis Obispo County is the perfect size to demonstrate impactful outcomes because of its small size and demonstrated systemic collaboration. Our powerful and intact collaborative relationships (see proposed Table of Coalition Members above) are currently regularly working together on several other projects, making success inevitable with this Regional Opioid Safety Coalition grant. This is a community issue that SLO County Drug and Alcohol Services has been working on for several years, so some of the initial work has already been developed and implemented. However, this proposed grant is very important to make a concentrated effort to propel the projects forward during the next eighteen months. Collaborative team building is a very important developmental process and occurs over time, it is not a one-time event. Team building will continue to take place in scheduled trainings (such as the technical assistance webinars and conference calls offered by CHCF). In addition, San Luis Obispo is regularly in the top 1/3 of the data indicators (deaths related to opioid pharmaceuticals, non-fatal emergency room visits), so the impacts of this grant funding will be noticeable in the county-wide indicators.

As shown above, SLO County’s primary drug use of heroin or other opiates is higher than statewide average. We have also been successful at decreasing methamphetamine use when we implemented programs specifically targeting that drug of choice.

What is the proposed structure?

SLO Coalition: the regional opioid safety coalition inclusion of all Steering Committee members and all Action Team members.

SLO Coalition Steering Committee: made up of all Leads from each Action Team, co-chaired by Public Health Director (Clinical Lead) and a Community Representative.

SLO Coalition Action Teams: co-chairs of each Action Team include one person from County Public Health/Behavioral Health/Drug and Alcohol Services (the lead agency) and one person from the community. The five proposed Action Teams are: Data Collection and Monitoring; Community Based Prevention; Intervention, Treatment & Recovery; Prescribers and Pharmacists; and Law Enforcement.



5. How will you measure the effects of the coalition’s work? The goals are to: 1) reduce opioid-related deaths in San Luis Obispo County by 30% in three years; 2) increase the utilization of CURES for prescribers and pharmacists; 3) expand the number of licensed physicians accepting referrals for buprenorphine treatment; 4) expand the number of distribution locations or access points for naloxone; 5) reduce the number of non-fatal opioid-related emergency department visits; and 6) decrease the number of opioid prescriptions per 1,000 residents in San Luis Obispo County. A Community Dashboard will be developed to track the impact of SLO Coalition.

6. How will you sustain progress after the collaborative is over? The funding for the SLO Coalition will end in eighteen months, but the collaborative will not be over until the work of reducing opioid-related prescription deaths in San Luis Obispo County has been fulfilled. The administrative support supplied through CHCF funding will be institutionalized, so that policies and procedures will be written and minutes will be kept from previous meetings and trainings, thus ensuring the continue learning needed to sustain the collaborative. Each coalition member will receive the data and the strategic plan in order to visualize the positive changes in our community in order to strengthen the commitment of each partner to continue the successful trajectory. A successful sustainability plan involves continual care and attention to the partner’s commitment. Only when the goals of SLO Coalition have been fully met, will the project be over.

7. Describe any collaborative, multi-organization work on opioid safety that the region has done so far and explain what the CHCF collaborative would enable your region to do that it has not been able to achieve to date.

San Luis Obispo County Drug and Alcohol Services became very concerned about the change in the drug using population that we began seeing in 2011 when we noticed a doubling of the prevalence of opiate dependent persons seeking treatment (from 6% to

12% as measured by CalOMS admission data). At the time, our treatment methods were geared towards methamphetamine users, we had no social model or medical model detoxification and we did have a methadone clinic in our county which was nearing capacity. We proposed to expand our county-run detoxification program and began using the medication suboxone to help opiate addicts on an outpatient basis. Our detox suboxone program was modelled after Haight-Ashbury protocols in San Francisco and was recently expanded again in 2014 through County General Fund support. In launching the detox program, we needed to work together with our Behavioral Health Medical Director (who is the licensed physician for suboxone) and the other private suboxone physicians in the community for continuity of care. In early 2014, deaths from prescription pain medications and heroin overdose became common knowledge. Working directly with the Dope Project in San Francisco we sought to implement an Opiate Overdose Prevention Project, using naloxone. Finding local partners, establishing protocols, and working through the various politics has been challenging. However, the data from our first year indicates a successful program has been launched. During the first year, we conducted 26 educational presentations and created 14 distribution sites to make Naloxone more available. Further data from Drug and Alcohol and San Luis Obispo Syringe Exchange Program are shown in the table below for FY 2014-15:

In our County, there are at least three efforts going on regarding opioid safety. Drug and Alcohol Services has provided interventions in the medication assisted treatment and the naloxone access areas. The medical clinicians have established a “Coordinated Care Plan Committee” with the local hospital staff to discuss common prescribing practices in the emergency departments. Law enforcement has implemented strategies concerning the supply side and diversion of opiates in the community--three distinct and different strategies with little awareness or coordination among them. Separately, the interventions may be effective, however, with coordination and collaboration, together the strategies can create a plan with goals, objectives, and demonstrate measureable outcomes. Purposefully, opioid safety interventions have stayed ‘under the radar’ at this point with only targeted interventions to the substance users in treatment. We currently can’t document any measureable outcomes over time, nor tie the outcomes (or lack of outcomes) to any interventions that have been implemented to date. There is a lack of a county-wide Regional Coalition to provide direction, leadership, and a voice for this dire issue in our community. Administrative support for the establishment of a regional safety SLO Coalition is exactly what we need at this time.

How would in-kind support and the grant funds be leveraged to advance this work?

The lead agency, Drug and Alcohol Services, currently receives County general fund support to assist in the development and implementation of outpatient detoxification services using suboxone. Furthermore, using the in-kind time of the Project Director along with the Coalition Coordinator (grant funded), a sustainability plan will be written by the end of the first twelve months of the project and reviewed by SLO Coalition.

8. What challenges do you expect to encounter? How do you anticipate addressing these challenges?

Anticipated Challenges	Potential Solutions
Community leaders are very busy in our County, so we anticipate that the leaders will designate staff to attend the Steering Committee and/or Action Teams.	Provide enough education about the project and the importance of the project to ensure the correct (energetic) staff are designated by the community leaders. Also ensure the co-chairs are committed to the Action Teams so that the project continues to move at an 'action' pace.
This is a county-wide SLO Coalition, however, there are three distinct geographic locations in our County (north, south, and SLO). Need to provide enough opportunity for regional participation while not triplicating the work.	Consider electronic means of participation in the Action Teams so that all areas of the County are represented and feel a part of the decision making. Stress the need for a uniform plan/process so that opiate users and their families are treated consistently.
Participation to be appropriate in the Spanish language, cultural competency of the plan is important.	Ensure that Spanish speakers are able to participate in all aspects of the SLO Coalition.

9. What leaders or organizations have you not been able to engage thus far that you think are important to the work? What prevented participation? How might you work to engage them during the grant period?

Medical professionals have been very difficult to engage in the process so far as we have focused on the substance users in treatment. The primary care physicians, hospitals, emergency departments, pharmacies and specialty providers have been minimally engaged during the efforts to date. To build effective collaborative relationships, especially when a project is new, takes time and consistent follow-through on commitments. The Coalition Coordinator will help to provide the communication, the meeting structure, and the follow-through needed to take SLO Coalition to the next level. Our Clinical Champion, Dr. Penny Borenstein is the County Health Officer, and the partnerships within the County Health Agency strategically placing employees in the Action Teams will provide a public health and treatment focus for SLO Coalition.
